February is Black History Month

February is Black History Month, the annual observance of the history of the African diaspora. It has been observed in the month of February in the United States and Canada since 1976. It was begun as Negro History Week by historian Carter G. Woodson in 1926 with the goal of educating the American people about

African American history. It concentrates on the cultural backgrounds and achievements of African Americans.

Someone asked me a few years ago: "Why is there a black history month?" There are many reasons. There are serious gaps in recorded black history. I can remember from my educational experiences in high school, college, and graduate school that any reference to black history was a brief reference. What I know of black history, I learned on my own, outside the framework of formal education.

Not only was there no simple factual and cultural history, there was no history of specific incidences of repression, rebellion, or inhuman practices within the culture of slavery. There are many reasons for this. One is that history was written and published by white people. Since education for slaves was discouraged, even forbidden by law, the slaves would not have had access to their own history even if it had been fairly and accurately recorded. Black history was transmitted almost entirely by oral tradition – by legends and storytelling. Even after the slaves were freed, there was for many years, no provision for education. When black people were admitted into the arena of public education, it was separate from white people, but certainly not equal.

There was history we never heard. Both white and black people were, and are, the poorer for the history about which we never knew. It is important to have an emphasis on Black History to remind us of the history we so easily forget or never knew to begin with.

We need to teach our children about the past. They need to know what happened lest it happen again. This is not to embitter or perpetuate hate. Our children will never understand who they are or the roots of their own heritage, unless we recite the stories of the past to them.

There is a sense in which the meaning of this month relates, not only to African-Americans, but also to non-African Americans. Our history and our future are inextricably woven together. We need the lessons that can come from an emphasis on Black History month to help us recognize our own biases and prejudices and attempt not to place them on others. We can in fact, honor each other's culture, race, life experience, belief system, class, age and gender. Perhaps then, we can do our best to acknowledge, and validate the feelings of others. Remember it was Jesus who said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you."



A Message of Thanksgiving

Wow, we have much to be thankful for! The Stewardship and Finance Committee of Trinity United Methodist Church asked the members and friends of the congregation to participate in the Fall Stewardship Campaign, and did they ever! As of January 23rd, our pledge total for 2024 is \$438,279, 14.5% above our pledge total for 2023. This is the highest pledge number for our church since 2017. We received pledges from 125 families and individuals this year, up from 112 for 2023. This also represents twenty-plus new pledges.

The initial "request" this year was formidable at 20% over last year's pledge total. Frankly, as a committee we knew it would be challenging to achieve this goal, so reaching 93.2% is truly a blessing. However, we had faith that all things are possible through God. Your prayerful considerations and love of Trinity Church and its many programs proved to us that Trinity United Methodist remains a strong presence in all our lives.

A warm thanks to all of those who not only pledged, but prayed for Trinity during this pledge drive. The Finance Committee is grateful for every pledge we received. May God bless our endeavor!







At our last Charge Conference, our District Superintendent Megan Stowe asked the question of those gathered, "What do you see for Trinity United Methodist in the year 2024 and beyond? I have been thinking about that question, and well, there are many possibilities for the church.

First our church could be a closed community of "true believers." A few of these churches already exist. The faithful gather, build a wall around them, and protect themselves from the dangers of the outside. They decide on the content of the "true faith," the right ideas –and everybody on the inside holds them. There is no question of these ideas and no challenge to them; and people become very comfortable. The closed community of true believers' chief characteristic is that they want to go back to the sure things of the past.

Now, these closed communities may be denominationally independent, they may be Roman Catholic, they may be Presbyterian, they may be Methodist, or they may be anything. But most likely, they see some point in history as the time when we had "truth", and they must defend that truth against attack, that is one possibility for the church of the future; and an unchanging entrenched minority that works to preserve the sacred past.

Another model for the future would be a church very much like Trinity. A church with a wide spectrum of members; a wide spread politically, economically, socially, and theologically. It is a church where there is room to disagree, where there can be controversy and sometimes conflict, because people honestly do not agree, but where there are common commitments that bind them together as a church.

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement in America, called this the "catholic spirit," by which he meant an "openness to other people." I believe this means that if people are to be confronted, it is done openly and in a spirit of respect and Christian love. This is very hard to do. It means recognizing that people of "good will" and even some people of "not so good will" can have a different view that may be valid. It means taking a moment to find out what is going on in the other person's life, if they want to reveal that. It means that we are prepared to listen. The reward is priceless: it means we are constantly fed and excited by the mystery of life.

Against this backdrop, where is our denomination? What we are committed to is the fact that people called "United Methodist" can believe a variety of things and still live together as Christians and as church people. In the United Methodist church, we welcome people of faith into our churches, and people who are searching for answers to life's tough questions, because we know what it's like to feel alone and unsure . . . to need a welcoming place with open hearts, open minds, and open doors. We answer the call of making disciples for Jesus Christ, and we live the promise the day we joined the United Methodist Church, the promise of our prayers, our presence, our gifts and our witness.

As we enter into a new year together, I look forward to serving as your pastor. May John Wesley's Covenant Prayer be the words that lead and sustain us each day: "I am no longer my own but Thine. Put me to what Thou wilt . . ." Would you like to discuss this more sometime? Please give me a call . . . I look forward to our future together at Trinity United Methodist Church!
