A Note from The Minister...



Everything to Lose, Everything to Gain

By the time you receive this newsletter we will be a mere few days away from entering into the Lenten season. Lent has traditionally been a season of somber sentiments and penitential moods. The season of Lent observes Jesus' 40-days of living in the wilderness as he honed his spirit in preparation for his mission and ministry. It becomes for Christians, then, a preparation for mission and ministry in our time.

Lent is also a festival, just as are all other liturgical seasons. Despite its focus on penance, passion, preparation, and the spiritual disciplines associated

with them, Lent is essentially a celebration of the paradoxical Christian lifestyle of suffering and joy. During this time, many people choose to "give something up" that they enjoy for a period of 40 days commemorating the time that Jesus spent in the wilderness.

The idea, originally, of giving something up for Lent was to share experimentally in the suffering of Christ. In medieval times, monks gave up butter and lard and fat in general for lent. They had an Ash Wednesday ceremony called "Burying the Fat" in which they would put butter in the casket, hold a funeral service, and bury the casket.

They gave up butter and lard and fat, because this made them feel constipated, and this - they felt - was their way of sharing in the suffering of Christ. Might I suggest, instead of, or in addition to, "giving something up." that we "take something on" in our lives that is above and beyond our everyday routine for the benefit of humankind.

I am reminded of an inspirational piece by the author Bendorovich entitled, What If?

"What merit has a kind heart if kept to oneself?
What use are good intentions if not acted upon;
What good does talent serve if left unfulfilled?
What worth have possessions if so many are poor;
What comfort is faith if not put into action?"

Abundant life is demanding. It requires that we give ourselves to God and to one another and to the beauty of the world. It is a paradoxical life we live as Christians. We have everything to lose, and have everything to gain. I will look for you in church this Lenten season . . .

Arm in Arm: Artists United Against Gun Violence is Back!

March 22, 2025, 7p.m.

Arm in Arm is a benefit concert that has taken place regularly since 2018 in response to mass shootings and the reality of gun violence in our own communities. Local artists are presenting an evening of artistic expression as they come together to work against gun violence. The concert is free and open to the public.

There will be several components to the evening: a visual display in Trinity's Community Gallery, featuring artwork by students from Sumner Ave Elementary School and the Trust Transfer Project; a concert featuring music, dance and original poetry; a monetary collection, proceeds of which will be split between EveryTown for Gun Safety and Springfield's own Darrell Lee Ienkins, Ir. Resource Center: and a meditation/prayer walk on the front lawn with luminarias and flags printed with the names of local victims of gun violence. The Gallery will be open from 6 -7 p.m., followed by the concert at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

Local performing artists include Trinity's Dance Movement Choir; the Gospel & Liturgical Dance Choirs from Wesley United Methodist Church, Springfield; The SciTech Band; vocalists Vanessa Ford & Regina Krawiec; poets Lisa Everett & Jane Schneeloch; organist Dr Christopher White, flutist Janet Dixon-Metcalf and violinist Erin Newcomb-Moore, Steve Hays, piano.

MARCH GALLERY EXHIBIT:

Trinity's Missions Committee is pleased and proud to announce that we have arranged to have a special traveling exhibit, "The Sacred Ally Quilt Ministry", shown in our own Community Gallery during the month of March.

The Sacred Ally Quilt Ministry was born during the long pandemic summer of 2020. Called to respond to the injustice and horror of George Floyd's murder, members of nine New Hampshire United Church of Christ congregations collaborated to make eleven quilts, which together memorialize the last words of George Floyd.

These quilts are prayers in thread. They are a distillation of four hundred years of oppression. They express the devastating pain of America's racial wounds. In churches, schools, and other institutions, these quilts have proven to be an effective tool for provoking transformative conversations about race in the United States.

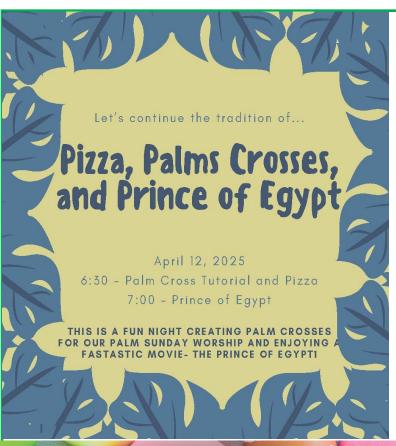
The quilts will be shown on: Sunday, March 9, from 10am-2pm; Tuesday, Mar., 11, from 10am-2pm; Thursday, March 13, from 4-8pm; Sun., March 16, from 9am-2pm.

In addition, there will be two special events. On Friday, March 14, from 7-8pm, there will be a film shown about the making of the quilts followed by a discussion. On Sunday, March 16, from 1-3pm, there will be an opportunity to participate in the creation of a communal sacred quilt for Trinity Church.

This sacred quilt workshop will be led by Kathy Blair, SAQM

coordinator, in Asbury
Hall. Together, we will use fabric art
to creatively express anti-racism/
social justice emotions and
reflections evoked after experiencing
the Sacred Ally Quilt display. No
sewing experience is needed, and all
ages will be welcome.

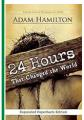

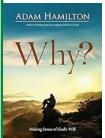

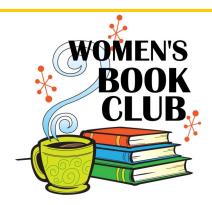
