Opportunity for "Living Saints"—The 2026 Stewardship Pledge Campaign

Each of us plays a vital role in the life of our church. The Stewardship & Finance Committee at Trinity is excited to announce the 2026 Stewardship Pledge Campaign under the theme "Living Saints." This year's theme highlights the everyday saints within our congregation. As stewards of our Methodist tradition, all members are invited to recognize their role in supporting the church's mission, ministries, and future. From maintaining the grounds to nurturing spiritual programs and outreach, stewardship is how we collectively care for the legacy and vitality of Trinity.


On Sunday, October 19, Vera Baker shared the following stewardship testimonial: "Of course, my pledge supports Trinity's rich worship services like the one in which we are participating today, and it supports all the ways Trinity 'serves the community and the world', but in the end I pledge because God has blessed me, and my life has been made richer by all of you."

The 2026 pledge goal is \$455,000, a necessary target to meet the increasing costs of insurance, utilities, maintenance and operations, staffing, and ministry programs. With a projected year-end deficit of \$30,000 for

2025, and expenses exceeding income by approximately 7%, the committee urges members to prayerfully consider increasing their pledges by 5-8%. Even a small increase can make a significant difference considering all pledges received. Members are encouraged to submit their pledge by using the QR code provided above, through the giving page of the church website, or by submitting a pledge card. Together, as living saints, we can ensure Trinity remains a strong and welcoming spiritual home for all.

Who is Feeding Whom?

It was a hot New England day in August. I showed up at church in the early afternoon hours. It was a day off for me. I quickly recognized several Trinity friends in the parking lot. As I walked over to the group, I saw several large boxes of produce. As I looked further, I saw a very long line of people waiting, bags in their hands. I saw young, old. I saw a beautiful variety of melanin. I heard different languages and dialects.

I was assigned to cucumbers. I was then told that there were two different kinds of cucumbers, so try not to mix them up. The long serpentine line of unfamiliar faces began to move. The people receiving the donated food were so grateful. They took lots of fresh vegetables and some bread. I engaged conversations with them. I learned about the meals and salads they were planning to make with the food. There was one smiling face after another. hugged me. To some, I spoke in Spanish; or others, I used my handy phone translator app to communicate. I humbly told them, "God bless you," as they passed me. In these tough economic times, I was so thrilled to be able to help make someone's burden a little less.

When all had gone, I drove home with a trickle of water falling from my eye. I cried because I did my part. I cried because I was doing God's work. I cried because of the number of babies that came through the line. I cried as I thought of the elderly folks hobbling through the line. I cried because of the hurt of food insecurity in front of me. I cried because I did a small part of one week of an amazing ministry. I cried because of our volunteers-church members who come week after week to donate their time and energy -hundreds of hours over the course of our partnership with the Food Bank. I cried as I thought of Matthew 25:35, "For I was hungry you gave Me food; I was thirsty, and you gave Me drink." We were feeding God by feeding our neighbor. I felt it. Even though we helped to feed our neighbors, I couldn't help but feel fed myself. The human connection that day fed me in ways I hadn't felt for a long time. Are you hungry for that connection? Come! Come join those who volunteer every first and third Wednesday of every month at Trinity. I promise

you will leave feeling satiated on so many levels.

Trinity UMC's Annual Charge Conference is at East Longmeadow UMC

Trinity's Annual Charge Conference will be held on **Sunday, November 9 at 7:00 p.m.** at East Longmeadow United Methodist Church [215 Somers RD, East Longmeadow, MA]. This is a combined conference with East Longmeadow and Wesley UMC. Please be sure to attend this important meeting.

This is a preview of the business of the Church Conference. These six items will be voted on separately by each congregation, by Consent Calendar—one vote for each item.

- 1) **Election of recording secretary**—The elected recording secretary is responsible for taking attendance and minutes for his/her congregation only. This must be submitted on the Church Dashboard. The required digital Church Conference Minutes report [worksheet available] follows the Church Conference agenda and replaces the narrative minutes. Church Conference Minutes are due one week after the conference.
- 2) **Approval of 2024 Church Conference Minutes** and any Special Church/Charge Conference Minutes since last vear's Church Conference.
- 3) **2026 Pastor Compensation Report**—Base compensation, housing exclusion [if designated by the pastor], housing allowance [if offered], and reimbursables are reported in whole dollar amounts by the Staff Parish Relations Committee.
- 4) 2025 Nominations Report—Vote on church leaders and trustees to serve in 2026)
- 5) Affirm the Names of Lay Servants, Certified Lay Servants, Certified Lay Speakers, and Certified Lay Ministers
- 6) **2026 Budget**—Our budget is still in development and will be presented at a later date by the Stewardship & Finance Committee for vote by the Ad. Council.

During this reading, the Dance Movement Choir brought forth a candle for each person and performed a special liturgical dance.

Thanksgiving Boxes

Giving out boxes filled with all the ingredients for a Thanksgiving feast to our neighbors in need is a long-standing tradition at Trinity Church, and we are looking for your support again this year. Boxes will be assembled by our Trinity youth that Sunday morning, the 23rd, and given out in the afternoon at Trinity's Parkside Pantry from 2-3 p.m.




